

Competition for the best overall club performance in most facets of lifesaving, also gave the Club an opportunity to win a major trophy, but once again we just missed out on first prize. Our third earned us a new rescue paddle board.

The boat crews again led the way in training, and it is a pity their keenness did not produce better results. The Rescue and Rescusitation Team qualified for the State final, but owing to a time mix-up, we did not compete. All concerned were disappointed.

The venue of the 1970-71 Australian Title was City Beach, Perth. A small contingent of Club members motored over the Nullaboar, and all enjoyed the trip. The hospitality of the Perth people made us wonder why we were leaving when departure time came.

Congratulations to Graham Baker for winning the "Weekly Swim" trophy, and to Gerald Lipman's patrol in winning the patrol efficiencytrophy.

Our carnival, during the season was on Feb. 28th, but the proposed sponsorship by a leading soft drink manufacturer did not eventuate.
