NAME

The name of the Club is:

AFFILIATION

The Club is affiliated with the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia (South Australian State Centre Inc.).

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the Club are:

- (a) To minimise the loss of life from drowning by providing patrols and apparatus.
- (b) To adopt the gear, drill and handbooks of the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia, to patrol that portion of Port Noarlunga Beach, south of the reef to the mouth of the Onkaparinga River, or to be on call within the Municipality of Noarlunga on such days and for such periods as the Branch shall from time to time determine.
- (c) To promote demonstrations and arrange classes of instruction in life saving.
- (d) To obtain facilities for life saving and to assist the Corporation of the City of Noarlunga and other Public Bodies in improving facilities for bathers.
- (e) To encourage the physical and social welfare of its members.
- (f) To purchase, take on lease, exchange, hire or otherwise acquire and deal with any real or personal property, rights and privileges.
- (g) To raise funds and borrow monies for the purposes and benefit of the Club upon such terms and such conditions as may be determined.





SECRETARY'S REPORT

It is with pleasure I present for your perusal, consideration and adoption the 31st Annual Report and Financial Statements of South Port S.L.S.C. Inc. for season 1990-91. A brief summary of the season's activites is as follows:

LIFESAVING

No lives were lost at South Port Beach. There was, however, a rescue of note and subsequent media coverage did well for our club prestige and the organisation in general. First aid cases this season increased and the care and professionalism shown by those attending members was exemplary.

The Club performed well in the State Centre Patrol Competition. The final results of this will not be known until the June State Centre dinner.

Internally our own competition was well received and all patrols again performed well.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership again has not changed significantly but appears to be slowly on the rise once again. This augurs well for the future.

COMPETITION

As a whole the Club competed well. Though not winning significantly in the Senior ranks apart from Ray Martin and March Past. However, in the Junior ranks the Club's performance was outstanding, finishing a close second at the State Junior Titles. Also it was encouraging to see such a strong turnout at the Masters Carnival.

ASSOCIATION AWARDS

As in the past John Nearmy has worked beyond requirements to again ensure our quota of awards were gained. This year, however, it was pleasing to see many other individuals attain instructors awards of varying degrees.

COMMITTEE

The Committee this season, it appeared, abounded with energy. All meetings were well attended and discussion on occasions was lively to say the least. However, as in the past it appears that 90 per cent of the work was done by 10 per cent of the people. So remember, it's your club, too. If it needs doing — do it.

FINANCES

Thanks go to the Treasurer, Ray Martin, for again keeping us on the straight and sometimes very narrow. Also to our canteen and bar areas: another good season with receipts of monies well appreciated.

As in the past dispersement of our State Government equipment grant continued. Also the City of Noarlunga grant was greatly appreciated.

A new sponsor most worthy of note is Caltex. With monies allocated for the "Caltex Cadet Crew" this should ensure our Club's future into the Senior ranks continues and grows stronger season by season.


CLUB HOUSE



PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In my first season as President of the best S.L.S. Club in S.A., I have been lucky to head a very hard-working Committee who have combined to ensure a very successful season. In contrast to the past few seasons, the attendance at Committee meetings has been high and the introduction of written reports by all Committee members and the inclusion of proxies has meant all members have been well informed and well represented.

The Club has maintained its Senior membership and the junior area has continued to grow, pointing to a bright future for South Port. I must congratulate Dean Colegate, his Committee and the Age Group Leaders for the manner in which the Juniors have run this year. Members who criticise unconstructively, those on committees or those working in the bar or canteen area should take a good look at themselves and either be prepared to chip in and work to make the Club a successful place or go elsewhere. What we need are members dedicated to keeping South Port S.L.S.C. the fantastic place it always has been and working towards an even brighter future.

JUNIOR COMMITTEE REPORT

We broke through the 100 member mark this season, with 70 of our members completing their National Junior Award for their age group.

The atmosphere down at the Club on Saturday training sessions has been one of great co-operation, with the Seniors providing great water cover in the swims and lots of encouragement to the Juniors. Mums and dads have helped out with running and judging events. A special thanks to our trainers this season: Chris Hegarty in the swim area, Murray Symonds and Kevin McCormack in the board area, Chris Mullins in the sprint and relay area, Richard Puplett, Dave Rawson and a host of others in the flag area, and anyone else I may have missed. But one group of champions I mustn't forget to thank are our Age Group Leaders — we wouldn't function without them: Colleen Kain, 7-year-olds and under; Rose Howse, 8-year-olds; Janette Puplett, 9-year-olds; Maureen McCormack, 10-year-olds; Sue Mullins, 11-year-olds; Mark (Glue) Gluis, 12-year-olds; Paul Howse, 13-year-olds. Our thanks also go to the Chief Instructor and Board Liaison Officer, John Nearmy, our "Junior" Board of Examiner members Chris Hegarty and Murray Symonds who all helped with the proficiency and N.J.A. certification of the Juniors.

Events this year kicked off with the Colonnades pageant. Although no theme was used this year, the parade was fun and well attended. Carnivals started at Seacliff with good weather and good results by us, but unfortunately our own carnival at South Port was cancelled due to bad weather. The Moana carnival saw big changes. It was both Senior and Junior mixed and male and female separate events. Considering these radical changes it went well. (Also club point scores were dropped.) The Port Elliot carnival was successful just like last year's and those who stayed on were treated to a mock rescue by the Rescue 2 helicopter and crew. This was later followed by an exhibition of jetty jumping by Super Gran (Mild Mannered Vi)! The Junior Southern Districts Carnival was held at Christies Beach and South Port won it again.

The National Junior Teams Championship was held here at Glenelg and South Port was ably represented in the S.A. team by Mike Hegarty, Sarah and Emily Martin, Dan Aulert, Melissa Keyser and Daniel Molenaar. Our congratulations to these great competitors. Also held in conjunction with these titles was a street parade for all juniors to participate in and our thanks go to Chris (Dollar) Foord for organising the surf boat for this cay.

State Titles — what a hard-fought competition this was, and no-one fought harder than our Juniors. There were some hard decisions against our kids, but to their credit they accepted them and rose to the challenge in the following events. The effort by all who participated led to us coming within a whisker of beating Grange and gave us second place and the Most Improved Points Score trophy, both for the second successive year.

In closing I would like to thank Richard Olesinski (Olle) and Pam Scott for the help they gave the Junior March Past team and Maureen McCormack for the marvellous job she has done again this year as Secretary.

For a lad of 18 and still studying at the time it was a job well done. Congratulations must go the March Past team for their bronze medal over at the Perth titles. They deserve better but you can't knock back an Australian Titles medal no matter what color it is. Well done, men! Well done, Hoo-Ray — top 10 in Australia for the Over 30 Swim.

In closing my report I must say that South Port's competitive future looks very rosy, with many talented Junior kids coming up. We must keep these young competitors interested, not only over summer but, more importantly, the off-season. This is where coaches come into it. These competitors need a board coach and a ski coach for them to succeed in Senior competitions. This Club hasn't had this for three or four seasons now and in that time we must have lost up to a dozen good competitors to other successful, competitive clubs.

Well done again, everybody, and will see you next season.

BOAT CAPTAIN'S REPORT

It's hard to believe another year has passed. Ollie's 40, R.J.'s 50. What on earth is happening? Time flies by but it seems nothing really changes in the boat area. Snake is still talking about self-draining boats, roller seats and I'm still hopeless. The winter of '90 all the boys did weights, ran and generally all I wanted in that department. We started rowing and everything was fine, training was going to schedule, we competed in the Boat Marathon from Brighton to North Haven and completed the course in fine style, finishing fifth overall. I can assure you it was a tough, in fact very tough course, with a 20 to 25 knot south-westerly blowing on the day. Even so, the crew performed well and everyone involved in the boat area was impressed with the effort. Training continued very well up to our next competition which was a new, innovative addition to the Nutri-Grain Iron Man Series, called the Surf Boat Spectacular. We had to qualify on the Saturday, 10th November, for the final on Sunday, which we did by taking out second position on the day. On the Sunday the competition consisted of five different events of rowing and running within one hour. We ended up coming sixth, winning a couple of hundred dollars for the Club. The morale amongst the crew was extremely high, so high extra training sessions were demanded by all members of the crew, but then we embarked on a change of training, concentrating on a different style which, in hindsight, was a mistake. Christmas came and went and the crews disintegrated. Frustration emerged and training broke down completely for a month to six weeks. Out of the ruins we did regroup and put a senior crew and a veteran crew together for the later part of the season.

The "As" competed, making the semi-final, and I know that had training not broken down they would most certainly have made finals and possible been medal winners. The veteran crew made the finals in the States, coming fifth in the final.




