NAME, AFFILIATION, OBJECTIVES, COLOURS

NAME

The name of the Club is:

"THE SOUTH PORT SURF LIFE SAVING CLUB INCORPORATED"

AFFILIATION

The Club is affiliated with the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia (South Australian State Centre Inc.).

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the Club are:

(a) To minimise the loss of life from drowning by providing patrols and apparatus.

- (b) To adopt the gear, drill and handbooks of the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia, to patrol that portion of Port Noarlunga Beach, south of the reef to the mouth of the Onkaparinga River, or to be on call within the Municipality of Noarlunga on such days and for such periods as the Branch shall from time to time determine.
- (c) To promote demonstrations and arrange classes of instruction in life saving.
- (d) To obtain facilities for life saving and to assist the Corporation of the City of Noarlunga and other Public Bodies in improving facilities for bathers.
- (e) To encourage the physical and social welfare of its members.
- (f) To purchase, take on lease, exchange, hire or otherwise acquire and deal with any real or personal property, rights and privileges.
- (g) To raise funds and borrow monies for the purposes and benefit of the Club upon such terms and such conditions as may be determined.

Club Colours — Navy Blue, White and Green.



SECRETARY'S REPORT

LIFESAVING

As is our history, no lives were lost at Southport Beach. The number of first aid cases was again similar to the previous season. To this end I must congratulate all patroling members for their expert care and sympathetic ears.

The state patrol competition was again thrust upon us at the end of the season and I believe we accredited ourselves better than last season.

This however will again not be known until the state dinner in June.

The internal patrol competition again was performed well and I congratulate John (beeper)Nearmyfor taking it out again. How about a new winner next season? **COMPETITION**

This season produced a surge in our competitive ranks. The Caltex cadet crew brought Southport to the fore again and showed how strong we will be in the ensuing short years ahead.


The running of this club is growing more difficult year by year. If any member can provide any support in any way, ask. Don't wait to be asked. Be pro-active not post-active.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

At the end of the 1991/92 season and at the Presentation Day, members said many times that South Port S.L.S.C. had completed a very successful year. I feel it is worthwhile to reflect on what makes a successful Surf Life Saving Club and see how South Port measures up.

First and always foremost, a Life Saving Club must ensure that the beach area patrolled provides a safe swimming area for the public and that a high standard of first aid is provided for all beach goers. The patrols should have a high profile on the beach and be able to respond to any emergencies in a fast efficient manner.

A successful club must also provide training in life saving techniques for its members and members of the general public and be continually updating the skills of its members both young and old.

Any Life Saving Club wishing to grow and prosper must provide a friendly, sharing atmosphere for all its members both Junior and Senior. The Club should be a place where all members of the family feel welcome and safe and where they can enjoy themselves and be involved with all aspects of Surf Life Saving. Each member should value all other members for the skills and individuality they bring to the club.

Competition and fitness training are also vital to the success of a Club as they provide members of all ages with the opportunity to increase their personal fitness levels and hence their overall wellbeing and to fulfill their competitive urges. The Club should provide competition within the Club and encourage and support members who compete in carnivals, State Titles and Australian Titles. Success in competition gives younger members of the Club "heroes" to look up to and adds to the pride and tradition within the Club.

A top club should also provide members with the chance to be involved in the leadership and management of the Club and to take on responsibility in line with their abilities. This chance to assume positions of trust and responsibility has assisted in the development of many young people in the past and can often be a stepping stone to success in other fields.

Another aspect Clubs should develop is the Social side and provide members with the opportunity to attend functions of many different types both of an adult and family nature. With so many individuals in a Club, functions must cater for as many members as possible, adding to the enjoyment and interaction of the members.

Finally a successful Club must be able to promote itself to other Clubs, to the Association and to the general public. Without public and sponsors support a Club or indeed Surf Life Saving cannot prosper. There must also be good communication between the members so everyone is aware of what is going on within the Club.

I honestly believe that for a Club to be considered successful and grow, all the previously mentioned facets of Surf Life Saving must be addressed and must be in balance. Season 91/92 has been a season where we have kept the right balance and this has been due to the fact that the vast majority of our members have Surf Life Saving at heart. It was pleasing to see the actions of one of our members, Dave Jolly, in saving the life of his neighbour using the skills and techniques learnt at the Club. The fact that South Port is known as a "family" Club is something of which we should feel very proud and we must do all we can in future to foster this feeling. The way in which the Junior and Senior Clubs have worked together as a single unit has enabled this cooperative, friendly spirit to grow.



JUNIOR COMMITTEE REPORT

What a big year for changes it has been for all our junior members. Some of the big ones have been:-

AT STATE LEVEL: The introduction of the junior sports policy. This had a big effect on the 8 year old age group, as the competition was modified at carnivals and state titles with the aim of lowering the emphasis on individual competitiveness. No medals were presented to the 8 year olds at state titles, instead participation certificates were given to those who competed. This format will follow on over the next 2 years, so as no serious competition will be available till the 11 year old age group.

"I reckon the pros and cons of this policy will ensure some lively debate for some time yet! Whats your opinion?"

The instigation of a National Training Camp ie. junior development squad, instead of a national titles. A shifting of emphasis from competition to committment and surf life saving skills on a broader basis, and placing the responsibility for pre-selection at club level. Our junior committe had a tough time making the selection allocated to South Port, but were proud to nominate Emily Martin, Michael Hegarty, Deon Kruger and James Mullins. Of these our congratulations go to Michael Hegarty and James Mullins who were selected in the final squad to go to Anglesea.

Introduction of 13 year olds into senior competition as well as maintaining their junior competitive status.

The desirability to have formally trained and accredited coaches for our juniors to the standard of level 1. to this end the junior committee extends its congratulations to Pam Scott, Helen Kruger and Chris Mullins who have taken up this challenge and completed this season, such courses as stated. Well done!

AT CLUB LEVEL: Farewell to the old and welcome to the new. We begrudgingly gave up our faithful Reynella pool swim training sessions in favour of the new pool facilities at Noarlunga Aquatic Centre. This was done over several months and all seem happy with the new centre. We still cater for the same needs as we did before, for our junior members, but also have included our senior members on this night. this has made for a better club atmosphere, and mum and dad have no excuses for not showing the kids how it's done! Ha! Ha!. Special thanks go to lan Burton and Mark Chilman (jnr.) for the solid support these guys have put into making this program work so well.



OUR KIDS: Well now that we have dealt with the boring stuff, let's talk about the kids. Numbers were down some, from last years exceptionally high membership. But the kids all performed well in all aspects of junior surf life saving. Proficiencies were well done and age awards were of a high standard.
