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




OBJECTIVES


The objectives of the Club are:

- (a) To minimise the loss of life from drowning by providing patrols and apparatus.
- (b) To adopt the gear, drill and handbooks of the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia, to patrol that portion of Port Noarlunga Beach, south of the reef to the mouth of the Onkaparinga River, or to be on call within the Municipality of Noarlunga on such days and for such periods as the Branch shall from time to time determine.
- (c) To promote demonstrations and arrange classes of instruction in life saving.
- (d) To obtain facilities for life saving and to assist the Corporation of the City of Noarlunga and other Public Bodies in improving facilities for bathers.
- (e) To encourage the physical and social welfare of its members.
- (f) To purchase, take on lease, exchange, hire or otherwise acquire and deal with any real or personal property, rights and privileges.
- (g) To raise funds and borrow monies for the purposes and benefit of the Club upon such terms and such conditions as may be determined.


Remember, you will be caught, if not today then maybe tomorrow. It is OUR CLUB and we all suffer for the sake of a few.

PRESIDENTS REPORT

I was sitting in the patrol shelter on a warm Sunday afternoon in March this year with the traditional yellow and red patrol cap on, thinking about what I could write in the President's section for our Annual Report this year.

My thoughts were interrupted by an attractive young lady who said "Schmidt, it's your turn in the tower, could you and Kylie take over for an hour". yes it was my Patrol Captain Nicole changing the shifts in the tower and generally organising the patrol members to do a mobile patrol to the river mouth and the IRB driver to shift some board riders out of the swimming area.

Suddenly it came to me the theme for my report will be Change — yes change in Surf Life Saving.

Fancy having a female patrol captain — why back in the 60's, the South Port Club had a large sign painted on the shed door "No Women Allowed". I looked around at the patrol on the beach and counted 7 females and 6 males and whats more they all seemed so young and fit — perhaps that is me changing. I cast my mind back over 10 years ago when females were introduced to Surf Life Saving — it certainly didn't bring about the doom and gloom that the mysogynists predicted but brought in a new mix of lifesavers with a great variety of new skills, ideas and enthusiasm. I also noticed how smart the patrol members looked in their yellow long sleeved shirts marked clearly "Surf Patrol" and their red shorts and how much more obvious they were to notice in the crowds on the beach. Surely this is a change for the better making it much easier for the public to reach a lifesaver in an emergency situation and also protecting the young lifesavers from the increasing menace of skin cancers.

Other changes were obvious as I looked around and compared this patrol with my early patrols 20 years ago. The patrol members were carrying radios and bum packs and this enabled us to send mobile patrols to the point or down to the river mouth. And of course there was the Rubber Duckie — what a boon they have been to our club. Now with the mobile patrols and the Rubber Duckie, we patrol a much larger area in a much quicker time in a much more efficient manner. Again the critics who said radios and rubber boats "just weren't Surf Lifesaving" have been long silenced. A touch of nostalgia flicked across my mind as I thought about the absence of the old reel and line — yes we had it tough in those days with the reel and line drills we went through until we reached perfection. But is it easier these days - young people training for their bronzes now have to contend with radios, oxyviva, IRB pick-ups, Aids, Hepatitas B ect. and when they get their coveted bronzes, there are the yearly proficiency test, the patrol competition and the Run-Swim-Run check up during the season. Yes there have been many changes and while I think it is harder today to get qualified to patrol the members on the beach are now more skilled, more adaptable and more vigilant than the group I used to patrol with 20 years ago. I have the feeling we look and perform more professionaly today.

Í also thought how the controlling body — Surf House or Surf Life Saving South Australia has changed to up with the rapid evolution in Life Saving. Not the little house on Military Road head quarters any more but a large complex at West Lakes. The "Towards 2000" concept has certainly worked to keep Surf Life Saving in SA up with and perhaps ahead of the times. The restructuring of State Centre was needed to enable life saving to cope with the changes in society which demand that an organisation advertising itself as Life Savers is in fact a responsible, organised and accountable body and I applaud Dennis Conlon, Elly Farmer and others who have had the foresight and push to move us into the 21st century.


While these high ideals were flashing through my mind, my thoughts were interrupted by a gaggle of young children in South Port bathers running across in front of the partol shelter and I thought "Nippers" whoops I mean "Juniors" — what a difference they have made to our club and the Life Saving movement as a whole. In the early seventies I went to a South Port club dinner at the Marion Hotel — one of the few places which actually had us back the next year incidentialy. At this dinner the "Nippers" fathers sat at a table of their own like lepers and were ostracised by the "Life Savers". What a change now — the senior committee consist of a majority of Junior parents, etc. Juniors or ex junior parents who have got their bronzes and are patrolling members of the club. Our whole club philosophy is based on us as a family club with Juniors and Seniors fully integrated and all members having equal worth in the club.

Yes the changes in Life Saving have been massive and as I see it, they are for the better making Life Saving a more efficient, more interesting and more inclusive organisation than ever before and an organisation which I would recommend to anyone

Again my thoughts were shattered by "Schmidt are you going to sit around all day daydreaming — you are supposed to be up in the tower."

Oh well some things never change — so off I trudged up the sand hill to the tower — grumbling about it as I went but inwardly loving every minute of it and not regretting any part of my association with Surf Life Saving for the past 20 years.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT

For example, patrolling members for the 1991/92 season was 60-70 compared to 98 patrol members for this season. The juniors were again a strong force, gaining a third place in the State Titles and taking out the Most Improved Club trophy again.

Much of the credit for those results must go the Chris Mullins, Junior Committee and the Age Group Leaders, who all worked very hard through the season putting kids through their different awards and training them on weekends.

Patrols for this season 1992/93 ran fairly smoothly with some good results in the State Patrol Efficiency competition, We averaged 90% in the four areas that we were examined in. Patrol personnel and especially patrol captains, I thank you for you dedication through the season to keep our beach safe (no lives lost again) 105 first aid cases and number of rescues and prevenatative actions. Well done to all involved! A special thanks must go to Travis (Scaff) for his work with the patrols. Considering this was his first season as Vice-captian he coped well with the task at hand. Great work was also achieved by our First Aid Officer, Chris Burton, who kept the First Aid room and equipment very well maintained. With the 105 First Aid incidents this season it would not have been an easy task.

I feel South Port is back again as a stong force in State Competition with a great improvement in all State Carnivals, State Titles and some great efforts at the National Titles. The return of D. Goldsworthy and Simon Martin both of whom were champions for South Port many seasons ago have helped South Port back up to the top. Welcome back! Another reason for the Club's improvement are the Under 16's, who are large in numbers, are highly competitive. There is some great potential in this group and all looks good for the Club if we can keep them all interested. A lot of hard work was done by M. Gluis (cadet supervisor) and R. Olesinski to achieve this and I must commend them on the super job that they did and I am sure that it would not have been and easy task at all.

South Port achieved some good results in the boat area, with the "A" crew training six sessions a week, making the final in every carnival after Christmas and were unlucky in missing out on a medal at States. (Hey Dollar, keep left mate). Well done to the Veterans who gained a Bronze Medal at the States for the second season in a row and also won the boat section at the Veterans Carnival. I personally and I am sure all the other boaties thank you, Chris Foord for your dedication and commitment because the results would not have been there without you efforts. Congratulations "March Past Team". Undefeated in local carnivals all season and gained another Bronze Medal (fifth one) at the Aussie Titles. Well done to all competitors for your season efforts.

During season 1992/93 the Club ran two successful senior carnivals and I must thank all members that got involved, especially the February carnival. It was a really messy day but the Club pulled together and the carnival referee was full of praise for the Club's efforts. Special thanks to Brain Steel and John Devitt for supplying tractors. Without you guys we would not be able to run these carnivals.




In closing, I would like to say thank you to all the members of South Port who aided and persevered with me this season. Listed below are all the statistics that really show how professional we were about this patrolling season.

The past season has been a very exciting one for South Port Surf Life Saving Club in the respect of competition. As I have often stated — competition is the shop window of surf life saving — and in this respect South Port certainly had their goods

The full results of the State Championships are included at the end of this report and you will see that there were some excellent performances recorded across the broad spectrum of competition. Particularly pleasing is the family aspect of the results — with families such as the Martins, Hegarty, Byrnes, Aulerts — all competing for the club ensures a strong base for the future. Also very pleasing were some of the team results with placings in the Senior Surf Teams and Taplin Relay. Those of us who were there to watch it will never forget Mark Sheppard's tremendous swim in the Taplin Relay and Mark Chillman's gutsy effort to maintain his position and make Seacliff fight for the silver medal.

The Australian Championships held at Kurrawa on Queensland's Gold Coast saw a very strong contingent of competitors and supporters travel to the Sunshine State. One of South Port's biggest competitive teams in some years — 38 competitors — attended the championships, and about 35 supporters. The results of the competition did not see South Port bring home a swag of medals but there were some very good performances never the less. Sarah Martin ran fifth in the Under 16 Ladies Board and made the final of the Under 16 Ladies Swim, brother Simon ran seventh in the Open Swim and made the final of the Open Iron Man and Mark Sheppard ran eighth in the Open Swim.

As I have already said a very good year indeed for South Port in relation to competition and with the Junior Division getting stronger every year and those members coming up to complete in the Senior Competitions the future looks very bright.

Congratulations and thanks to all those members who completed with such distinction for the club in the past season. It is your efforts that make it such a pleasure to be part of a great club. Next year who knows what we can do if we all get in and give it a good old South Port try.

Sincere thanks also to Steve Gordon, Olly and John Aulert who supported the


group and myself throughout the 1992-93 season.

What a year! Last May, I called a meeting of interested members to make up an "A" crew to train in a way so as to make finals as a matter of course, not a hope.

David Watt, Craig Austin, Robert Pummeroy, Make Willsmore, Ian Hodgens, took up the challenge. Winter training commenced with weight work, up to 5 sessions a week. Specialised coaching by State River Rowing coaches at West Lakes changed our rowing style radically. I must admit the boys changed to river style without any trouble. Into the boat in August preparing for the first event, the Lennies Marathon on October 15th. "Lennies Marathon" we finished 4th overall, a much improved result on previous years.

JUNIOR COMMITTEE REPORT 1992-93

Congratulations are extended to Aisha Olesinki and Rhian McCormack who were selected in the final squad. I am sure that they both had a good time in Tasmania.

This season also saw the inaugural State Junior Development camp for 10 and 11 year olds held at Fort Largs Police Academy in early January. South Port had five participants attend this camp, Sara Colegate, Daniel Edge, Michael Scott, Matthew Adams and Keir Puplett. Dean and Liz Colegate also attended the camp as co-ordinators. This camp was a great breakthrough and a big step forward for surf life saving junior development in South Australia. John Fitzgerald (director of youth development) must be congratulated for orgainising and co-ordinating the camp. All those from South Port who participated in the camp certainly got a lot out of it and thoroughly enjoyed themselves. The second State Development camp will be held this year in late December.

This season saw seven more junior parents gain their Level I coaching accreditation by dedicatingly attending weekly theory and practical sessions over six weeks during the season. Congratulations to Dean and Liz Colegate, Ian Burton, Maggie New, Kevin McCormack, Susan Mullins and Fred Molenaar.

Competition wise, South Port competed extremely well throughout the season. We finished second to Seacliff at the Christies Beach Carnival in December. We won the mid-coast, 4-point carnival at Port Noarlunga in January for the fourth consecutive year, won the carnival at Brighton and finished in a commendable third place at the Junior State Championships, just five points behind Grange with Seacliff taking out the championships. Not a bad result for a small club with just fifty five competitors nominated for the State Championships. It was pleasing to see the enthusiasm displayed by all the participants in both their teams and individual events with some outstanding performances. The March Past team did extremely well finishing in second position and winning the trophy for the highest overall point score for the season. Congratulations to the team and their dedicated coach George Hann and his able assistants, Liz Colegate and Pam Scott. The two R and R teams did extremely well, finishing first and second in the heats on the Saturday to complete in the final on the Sunday morning. We also put fourteen junior members through their Resuscitation Certificates, thanks to Dean and Liz Colegate for instructing the group and thanks to John Nearmy for conducting the exams.

This season saw the largest group of thirteen year olds (thirteen) gain their Surf Life Saving Certificates and go on patrol. As a group they patrolled 366 hours for the season which in itself shows great maturity and responsibility on their part and they are a credit to themselves and the club. We all wish them good luck as they move on into the senior ranks. Thanks go to Chris Hegarty for instructing the group (his third successive season of instructing 13 years olds) and John Nearmy and his fellow examiners.

Finally, in closing I would like to thank everyone for their help throughout the season. Pam Scott as Secretary, Ian Burton as Gear Steward, water cover during board training etc. Martin Chilman for conducting Thursday evening board training sessions, all the patrols and everyone else who helped with water safety cover. 



Olympic kayak paddler Lynda Lehmann dominated in the water, winning the women's ski event from fellow kayaker Joanne Patterson.


Lehmann earlier won the rescue tube race from Simpson.

Always room for improvement though.




We are the legendary Shivering Shags.



Finally, thank you for the opportunity of representing the club as touring team manager.





The gear shed is taking shape. It will have more room once Dollar's old boat


goes — "sorry, Dollar."
