

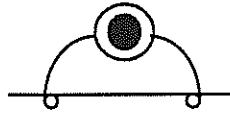

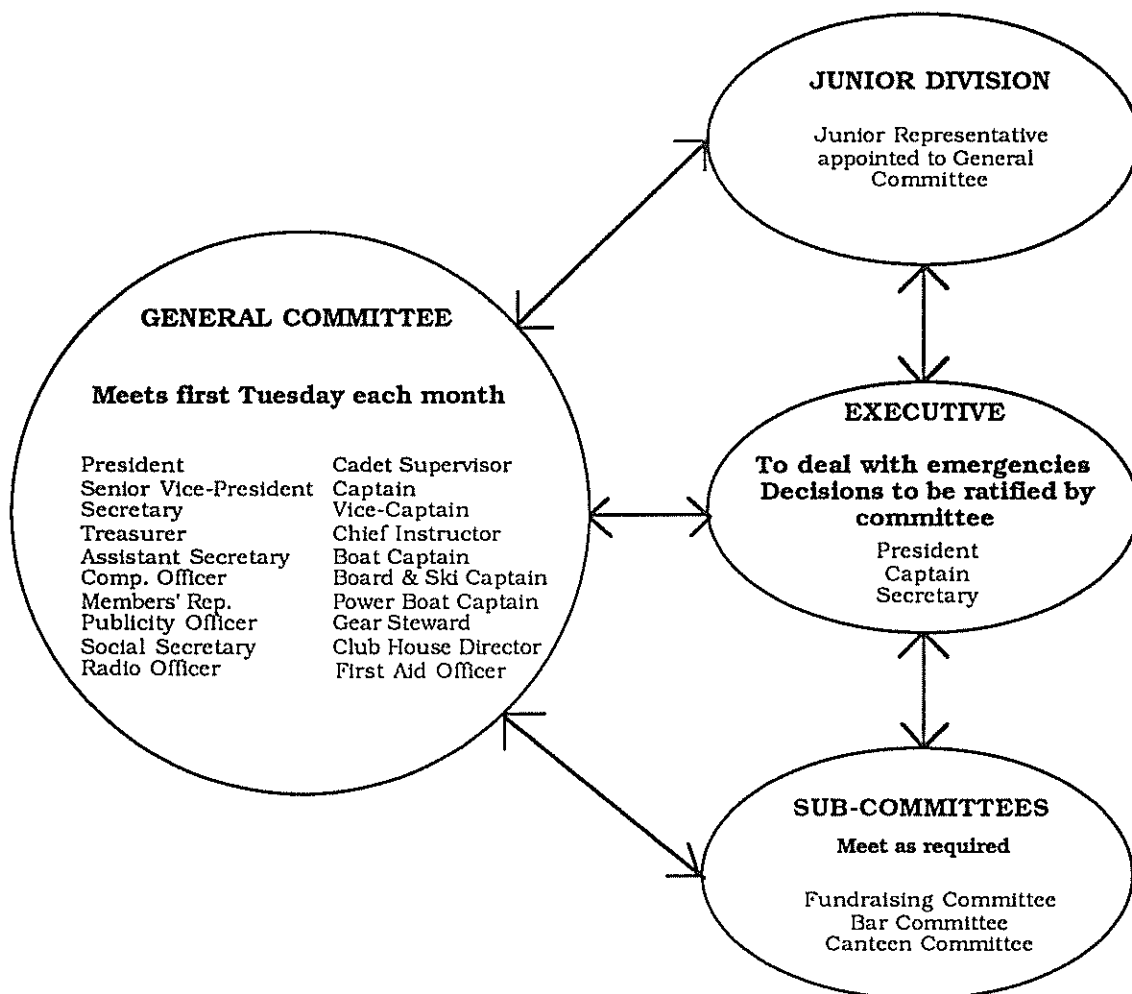


Front cover: March Past Team

The name of the Club is:

"THE SOUTH PORT SURF LIFE
SAVING CLUB INCORPORATED"

AFFILIATION

The Club is affiliated with the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia (South Australian State Centre Inc.).

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the Club are:

- (a) To minimise the loss of life from drowning by providing patrols and apparatus.
- (b) To adopt the gear, drill and hand-books of the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia, to patrol that portion of Port Noarlunga Beach, south of the reef to the mouth of the Onkaparinga River, or to be on call within the Municipality of Noarlunga on such days and for such periods as the Branch shall from time to time determine.

- (c) To promote demonstrations and arrange classes of instruction in life saving.
- (d) To obtain facilities for life saving and to assist the Corporation of the City of Noarlunga and other public bodies in improving facilities for bathers.
- (e) To encourage the physical and social welfare of its members.
- (f) To purchase, take on lease, exchange, hire or otherwise acquire and deal with any real or personal property, rights and privileges.
- (g) To raise funds and borrow monies for the purposes and benefit of the Club upon such terms and such conditions as may be determined.

COMPETITION

Congratulations to the South Port Senior March Past Team on its perfect score and winning the Gold Medal at the Australian Championships this season. Also congratulations to Bob Mayo on coaching the Junior March Past Team to the gold medal at the Junior State Championships and the Senior team to gold at the Senior State Championships as well as the Aussies. Well done Bob!

The Juniors and Seniors both acquitted themselves extremely well at their respective State Championships, both finished fifth in the overall point score.

PATROLS

This season, South Port patrolled the beach for a total of 6,479 hours, a credit to all participating members. The Club also performed 18 rescues and attended to more than 90 first aid cases.

JUNIOR STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

One of the major events of the season was South Port hosting the 1995 Junior State Championships. The entire club did a magnificent job in conducting the two day carnival. Congratulations go to Travis Nearmy, in his first season as Club Captain for his organisation of man power and work parties etc., over the two days of competition. Special mention to John Nearmy for organising and coordinating the water cover and patrols for the two days of competition. Also special thanks to all the 1994/95 South Port members who gave up their time to help organise and conduct the carnival, especially those members who put in excess of three days work to ensure the carnival was a success.

REGISTRATIONS

Registered members were down from last season — 318 to this season's registered members — 250, a drop of 68.

ASSISTANT SECRETARY

Many thanks to Paul O'Donahue for paying his registration for the season so he could travel down to the club every first Tuesday evening of the month to spend 3.5 hours taking the minutes of the management committee meetings. Well done Mork!

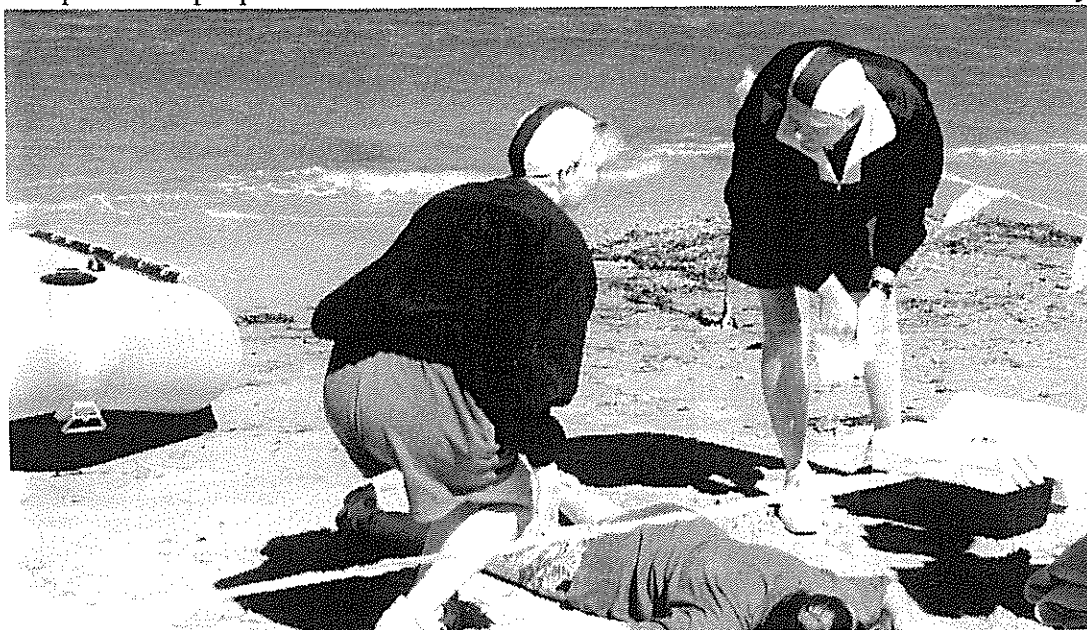
Although the number of the awards that went through this year was quite good, the disappointing aspect of the total is that we only gained one training officers certificate and two radio instructors certificates.

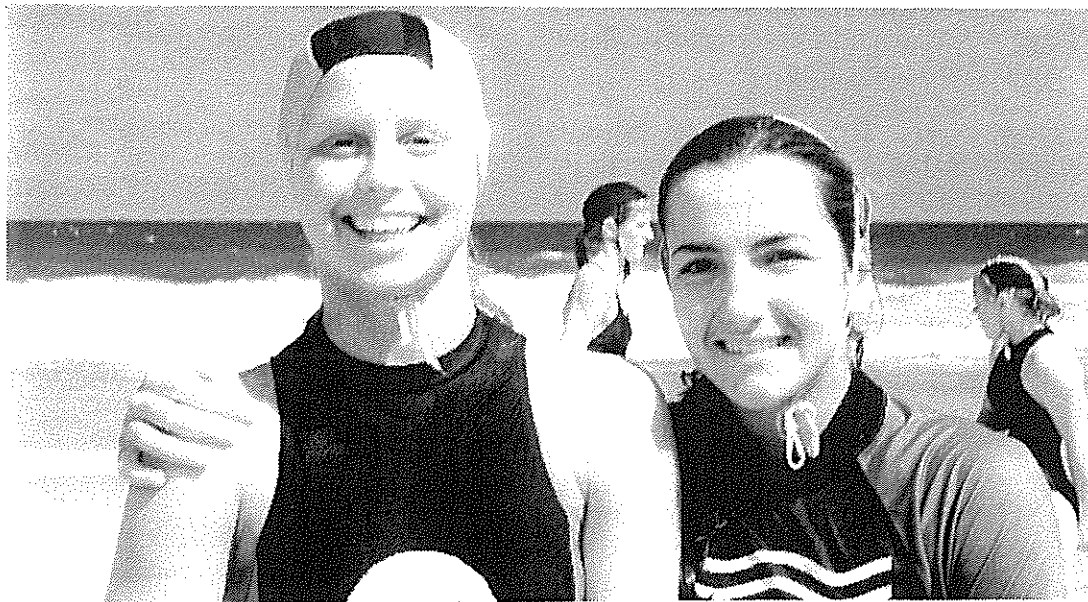

Gold was also won by the 11 year old Cameron Team and the March Past team. for the first time a small group contested at the Royal Lifesaving State Titles. At the pool events we came last overall but each child won a medal from a variety of events. South Port easily won the beach events. We will consider hosting the beach events next year.

South Port Juniors have purchased a technically superior "Bennett" board this season. We are in the process of purchasing three similar boards which should enable us to be more competitive next season.

This season we put 55 children through their National Junior Awards. thanks to the NJA Co-ordinator, Dean Colegate. Thanks also to Liz Colegate and all the Age Group Leaders for their assistance. Dean, Liz and Pam Scott also put 11 children through their Resuscitation Certificates. Thanks to Ian Burton for examining this group. Eleven children completed their Surf Lifesaving Certificates under the guidance of Dean Colegate and Chris Hegarty. Many thanks to Dean and Chris.

This was my first year as Junior Chairperson. I was extremely fortunate in taking over from Chris Mullins who had kept excellent files and records which were relatively easy for me to follow. His ongoing support and advice were invaluable and highly appreciated.

Jarrad Hanton, Brad Foord and Fran Byrnes coming third in U16 Board Relay Team.

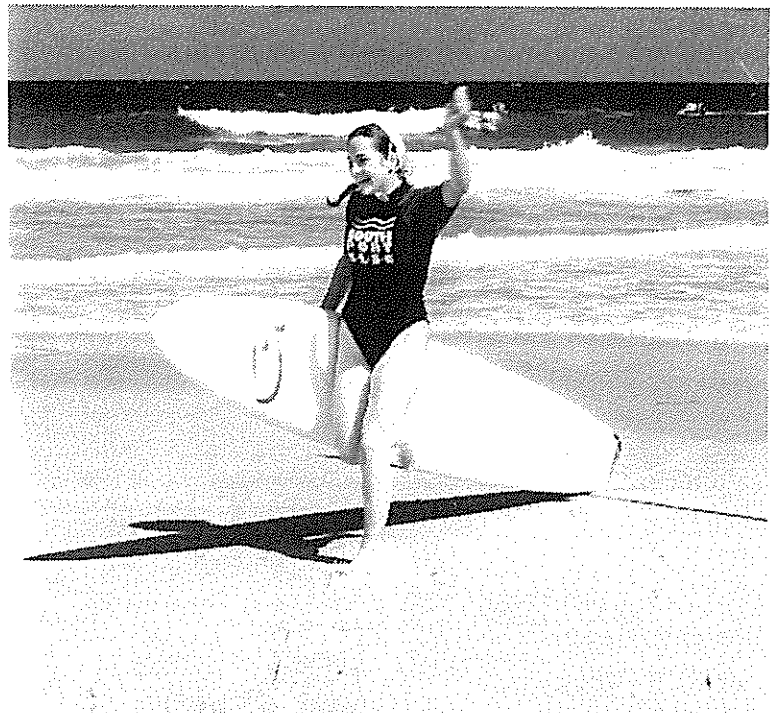
Throughout the season in local competition, the U16's performed well with some members not as competitive "but at least having a go". That's what it is all about!

A big thank you to Andy Higgs for all his training and expertise and 'acting' abilities.

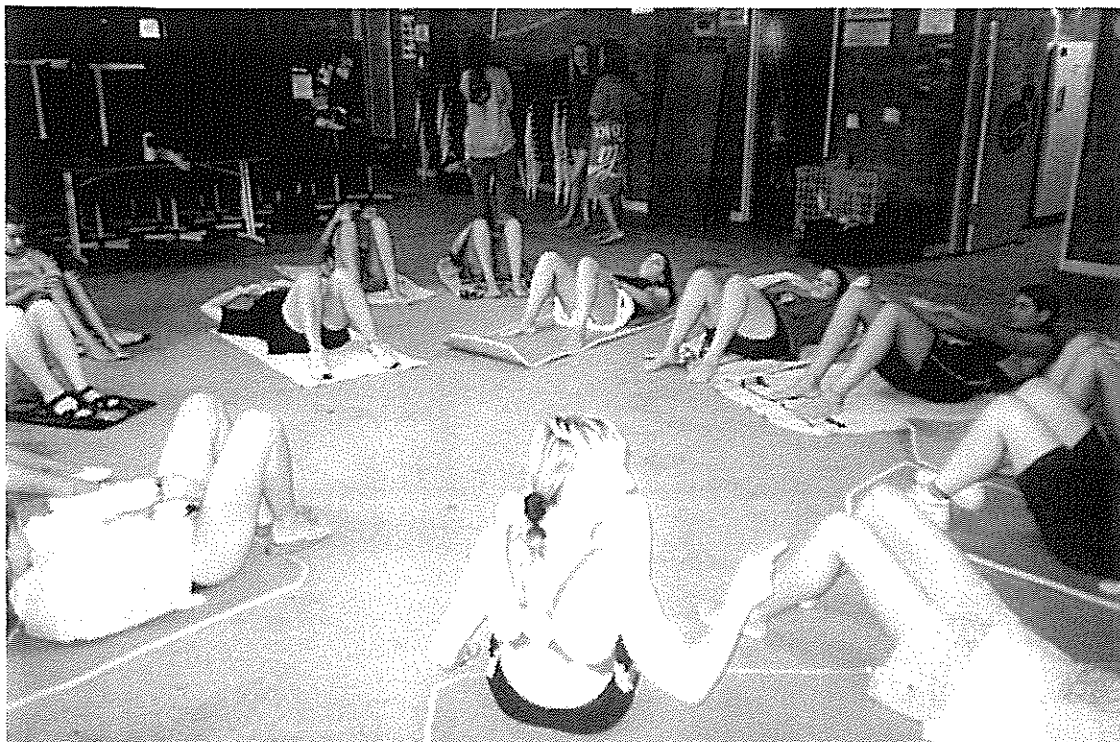

So ends another season. Once again full of triumphs and disappointments. We won a few, we lost a few but at the end of the season, Queensland was great!

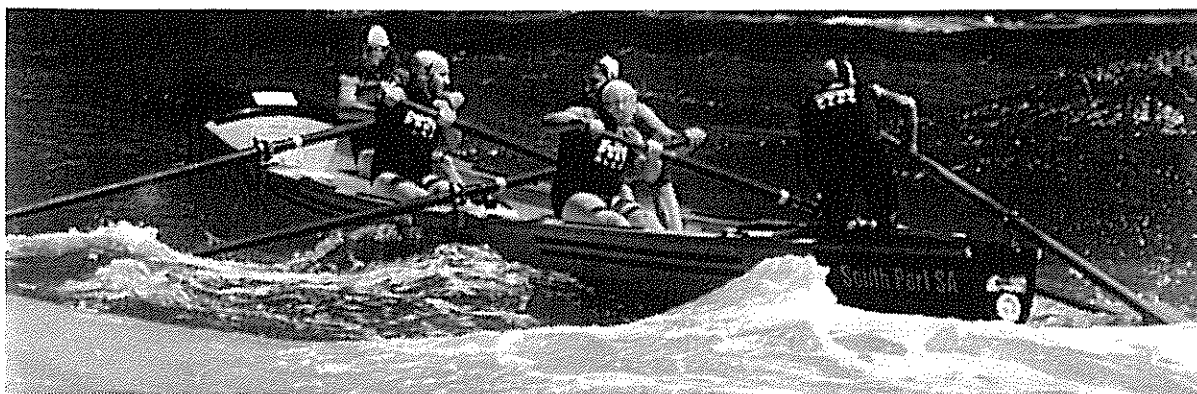

Lifesavers warn swimmers to take care after rash of rescues

By SCOTT COWHAM

MORE than a dozen people have been rescued from drowning in the past three weeks by a southern surf lifesaving club, prompting concerns that beachgoers are being careless and ignoring warning flags.

The Southport Surf Lifesaving Club, which covers 2km of coast from the Port Noarlunga Reef to the Onkaparinga River's mouth, also has warned another 50 people to swim between the yellow and red flags.

Club publicity officer Dick Olesinski said that swimmers risked being swept out to sea if they did not stick to designated areas.

"In the last few weekends people have not been noticing flags and swimming outside and that can be quite dangerous," Mr Olesinski said.

"Clubs always put red and yellow flags in the most safest positions for people to swim ... but people have had their lives saved over the last few weekends.

"What we are finding with the rescues and first-aid cases is that a lot of people are from the northern suburbs ... and these people are not exposed to the beach."

Mr Olesinski said 14 people had been rescued in the past 20 days, with some being rushed to hospital.

He said an intensive education program should be launched warning visitors of beach rules.

Mr Olesinski said people feeling like they are being swept out to sea they should not panic and put a hand up in the air to be seen.

Club president Peter Sutton said 10

beach was not dangerous with a lot of the recent problems caused by the "carelessness of people including a rescue of a girl who was drunk".

"A lack of knowledge and possibly a little bit of carelessness on behalf of beach users causes 90 per cent of the problems," Mr Sutton said.

"It is not the beach it is the people.

"It is like anything, I don't walk across the road without looking both ways."

Lifesavers save nine in big surf

The Southport Surf Lifesaving Club had a busy day yesterday.

Its 10 surf lifesavers and inshore rescue boat saved nine people from the high surf and warned about 30 others from dangerous locations along the Port Noarlunga South beach.

Club spokesman Mr Dick Olesinski said boogie board users and other surfers should pay heed to the red and yellow flags lifesavers placed on beaches prone to dangerous rips and tides.

He said it was fortunate no one required resuscitation or hospitalisation yesterday.

South Port upset Grange's run of wins in the A grade boat race while Seaclyff's former State champion Rob Nelson maintained his dominance on the ski, taking out his third consecutive open single ski race and combining with clubmate Gavin Needham to win the double event.

Adelaide's mid-coast beaches are the playground for nearly one million visitors and locals every year ... so the surf lifesavers have their work cut out for them.

Dick Olesinski, of the Southport surf lifesaving club said his group was "very busy" every summer.

"In our area, between November and April, we had 250,000 visits last year," Mr Olesinski said.

"At Southport we had 44 rescues last year, and 59 preventative actions, where we stopped people before they got into trouble.

"It's certainly the way to

nancial supporters, they're also in kind supporters," he said.

"Seaford Rise is also very active in providing shade shelters along the beaches, which are used by the public and surf lifesavers.

"They help with the set up of carnivals in the region, including providing the use of a Seaford Rise vehicle to move equipment on and off the beach."

"We would do it a lot tougher if we didn't have that kind of support, no doubt."

SOUTH PORT: This beach, complete with good surf, Onkaparinga River outlet and reef, attracts surfers, anglers, snorkelers, paddlers and bathers. Parking is limited and access to the beach requires a reasonable walk. A kiosk is located at the South Port SLSC. Rips and currents can be strong and swimmers are advised to avoid the Onkaparinga River outlet, due to sudden depth increases and occasional pollution problems.

South Port capped off SA's best national championships with a flawless display for gold in the traditional march past event, while Seaciff proved its worth as lifesavers, finishing second in the champion patrol competition.

South Port club surf patrols were recently kept busy with warm weather, good surf and big crowds. Fourteen people were rescued from two rips operating in the area. Swimmers are advised to always swim between the yellow and red flags set up at all patrolled beaches.



Rescues spark swim warning

An alarming number of rescues this summer has prompted a warning from lifesavers for beachgoers to swim between the flags.

Surf Lifesaving Association spokesman Mr Shane Daw said yesterday that in the first four weeks of summer, lifesavers had carried out 44 rescues and 81 people with first aid. Among the rescues carried out was a self after diving off the jetty last weekend.

Mr Daw said the man hit the beach and removed hair and skin from the surf at a floating face down in the sea, 20m from shore. The woman had been drinking alcohol and was sighted just seconds after she fell unconscious.

"The beach is a fantastic playground but you've got to use common sense," he said. "We have a number of victims ... never going to be people ne

Competitors at South Port have recently performed well in the opening round of surf carnivals. Under 16 competitors Brad Foord and Aisha Olesinski have started the season well as has the club's march past team, which is undefeated this season. The MAKITA senior surf boat crew also won their first open surf boat race in hot, flat, trying conditions at the recent Brighton carnival. The crew is looking for the club's first open boat title since 1968.

As last summer, a surf safety hint will educate the surfing and bathing public as how to enjoy themselves but also be aware of certain situations at the beach.

SURF SAFETY HINT:
Always swim between the red and yellow flags - this is the safest place on a patrolled beach.

Top junior lifesaver chase State titles

SOUTH Port Beach will be swarming with SSA's surf lifesavers of the future on Saturday, March 4, and Sunday, March 5.

About 1500 7-14 year olds will give their heart and soul as they take to the sand and water in the 1995 Smith's Crisps Junior State Championships. The State championships are the culmination of a lot of hard work and training for these youngsters who have battled through a number of surf carnivals so far this season in preparation for the big one.

"To these little tackers of the surf this event is like the Australian championships are to our seniors," Surf Sports manager Rob Nelson said. "The effort they put in is incredible and they really get a thrill out of performing!"

In the senior ranks the competitors must complete a designated total hours of community service before being allowed to compete. This is mirrored to a certain degree in the junior area. The junior division is the breeding ground for not only the future surf lifesavers but also future Australian champions.

The rescue and resuscitation events will kick off at South Port Beach (in front of the South Port SLSC) at 8.30am on both Saturday and Sunday with all other events starting at 9am. All teams will be on display in the colorful March Past event on Sunday at 12.30pm.

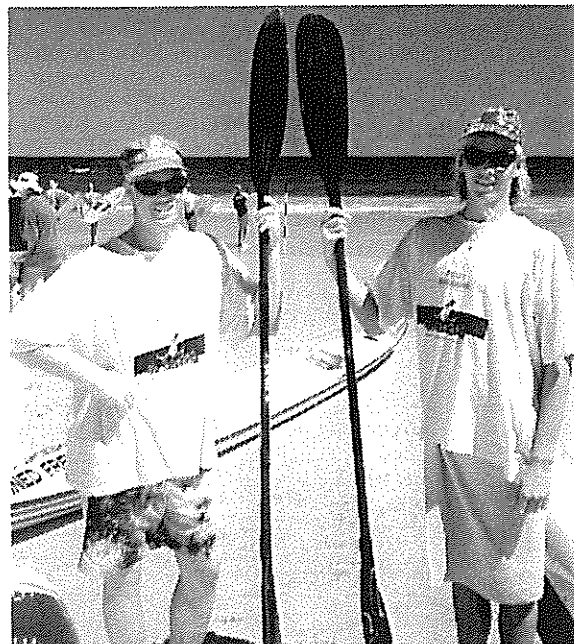

AUDITOR'S REPORT

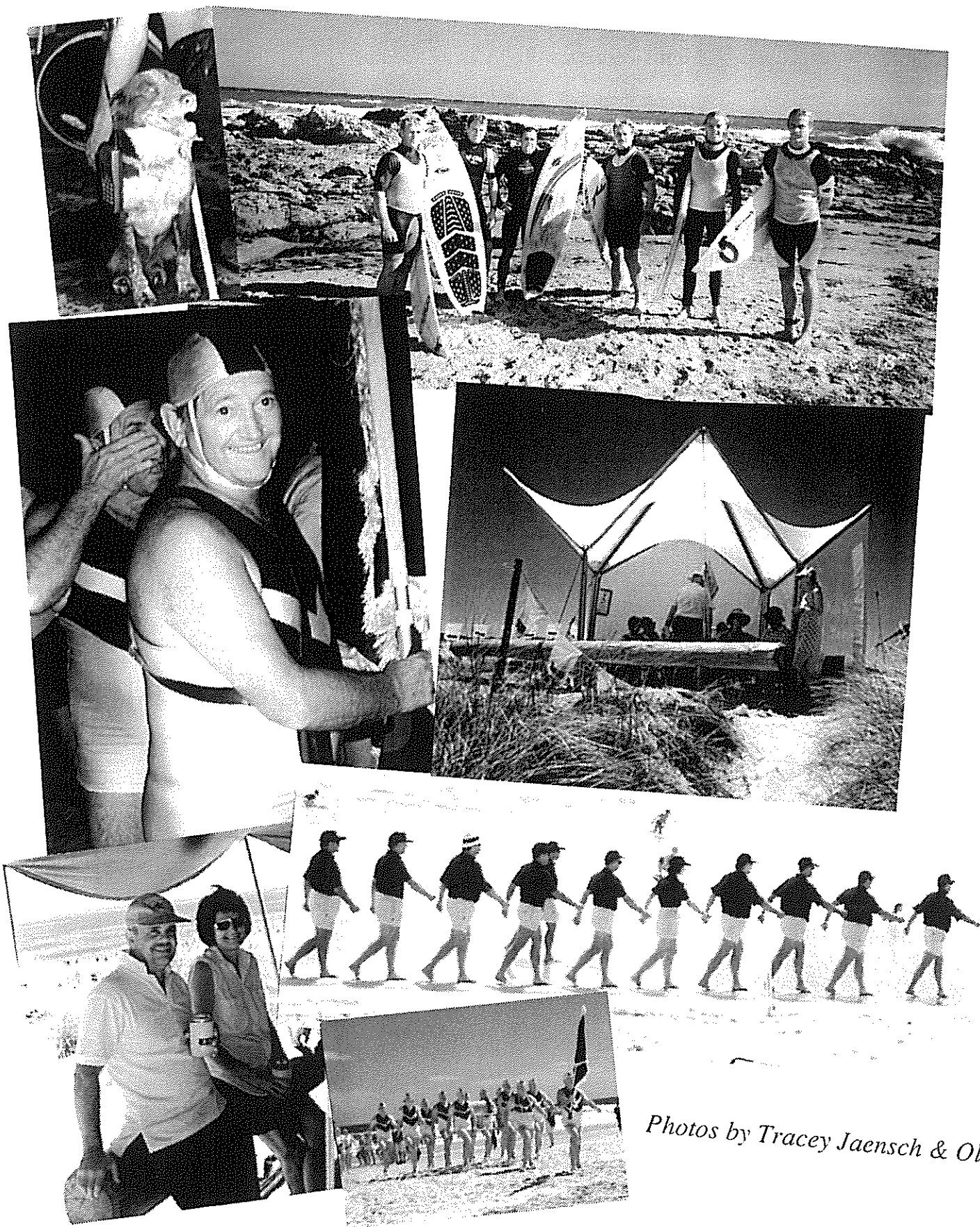
